

# Call it defiance. These dancers actually dance

### CONFLUENCE

Peggy Baker Dance Projects At Enwave Theatre in Toronto on Wednesday

ontemporary dance has taken so many twists and turns into text, multimedia and postmodern movement that it's almost a shock to sit through Peggy Baker's show. The dancers actually dance.

The show Confluence includes two new works by Baker (the solo earthling and the trio coalesce) and a duet by New York's Doug Varone (armour). The connecting threads are American author Lewis Thomas's meditations on biology in his 1974 classic The Lives of a Cell and Montreal sculptor/videographer Sylvia Safdie's insect imagery.

Baker and Varone are not avant-garde creators. What the works possess, however, is a meticulous sense of shape and pattern. One takes a kind of Zen-like tranquillity away from the program induced by the nuanced delicacy of each minutely detailed movement.

Baker's body, for example, all tortured angles and distortions, evokes a creature who struggles against death throes in earthling. Kate Holden, Sean Ling and Sahara Morimoto enact an impulse/reaction pattern in coalesce, where a single shift in movement inexorably leads to new pathways. And Baker and Larry Hahn are entangled together on the floor in armour – always connected, but with each conjoined slow twist and turn fraught with tension.

As for the staging, Debashis Sinha, Marc Parent and Caroline O'Brien have created a brooding electronic sound-scape, atmospheric lighting and evocative costumes for all three works, which adds to the unified feel of the program. The works are performed as one act, uninterrupted by bows.

Ultimately, Confluence is defiantly modern dance. The dancer's body is idealized as an instrument of beauty: One arm sweep becomes eloquent poetry; the surrounding space caresses physical presences – and no matter how melancholy, how relentless, how troubled the themes, dance itself is the radiant medium of expression.
